3. Course Description

The Certificate in University Teaching is a hybrid program offered to UTT faculty, part-time instructors and staff wishing to expand and improve their teaching skills. The program combines face-to-face and online (asynchronous and synchronous) modalities in order to provide flexibility and experience with a range of delivery formats. There are 14 topics spread over the fall and winter semesters. Each module takes approximately 3 hours to complete.

4. Learning Outcomes

On the successful completion of the course, you will be able to:

1. Engage in a community of practice through discussion and reflection to critically evaluate teaching practices and classroom strategies.
2. Use evidence-based teaching practices to design teaching and learning activities that foster student engagement (active learning, UDL, authentic assessment, etc.)
3. Discuss and apply principles of instructional design including constructive alignment, strategies to promote significant learning and relevant assessment (methods/activities/techniques).
4. Make informed choices regarding the use of various learning technologies in your teaching practice.
5. Articulate a personal teaching philosophy based on your investigations and analyses of teaching and learning.

5. Course Design

This hybrid course has been designed to provide you with an opportunity to devote time to reflecting on and developing your teaching practice.

To get the most out of this course, it will be important to be an active participant, in both the online and face-to-face settings. As part of the program, all participants will work with a group to lead one of the course modules.

In most of the modules, an online component will be made available by the end of the previous module end date. Expect to devote approximately 3 hours total to each module (this includes any face-to-face or Zoom meetings). Some modules will be completed completely asynchronously, meaning there will be no face-to-face or Zoom meeting.

8. Evaluation Method

Successful completion of the Certificate Program requires:

- Ongoing participation throughout the program – a minimum of 10 out of 14 modules (complete/incomplete)
- Co-facilitation of one learning module with peers (complete/incomplete)
- Presentation of teaching philosophy statement (complete/incomplete)

While there is no formal evaluation as part of this program (you will not receive a “grade” or professional designation), the activities provide evidence of your progress and learning over time. You will be able to use these activities as a resource and as evidence of your teaching development for your portfolio.

During the program, you will participate in a variety of different learning activities, including:
